

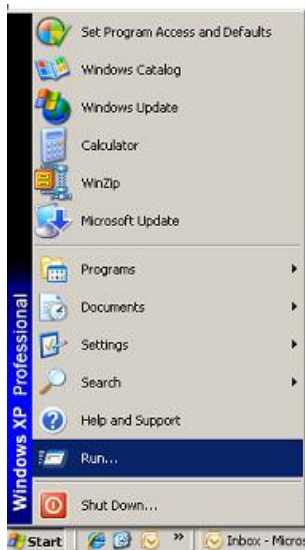
# How to Setup Automatic Logins

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**D**o you work from a home office? Are you the only one with access to your computer? Are you tired of having to login to Windows every time you boot up your computer? If so, this article may help save you some time.

You may have noticed that after updating, your computer no longer logs in to Windows automatically. This will happen after installing the Microsoft *.NET Framework*, which may happen without your knowledge if you have Windows Automatic Updates enabled. The computer will no longer log you in automatically because installing the *.NET Framework* created another user account called ASPNET.

You can setup your computer to automatically login again by following these simple steps.



Click on the “Start menu” in the lower level corner of your screen and choose “Run”.

In the command line type “CONTROL USERPASSWORDS2” and click OK.



In the User Accounts screen, select your account from the list and uncheck the box at the top of the screen that says “Users must enter a user name and password to use this computer.” Finally click OK at the bottom of the screen, and the changes will take effect the next time you restart the computer. You should no longer be prompted to type in a password when you turn on your computer.

This option may not be available on some versions of Windows, depending on how your computer is setup. It is not recommended that you do this on any computer other than your home PC.
